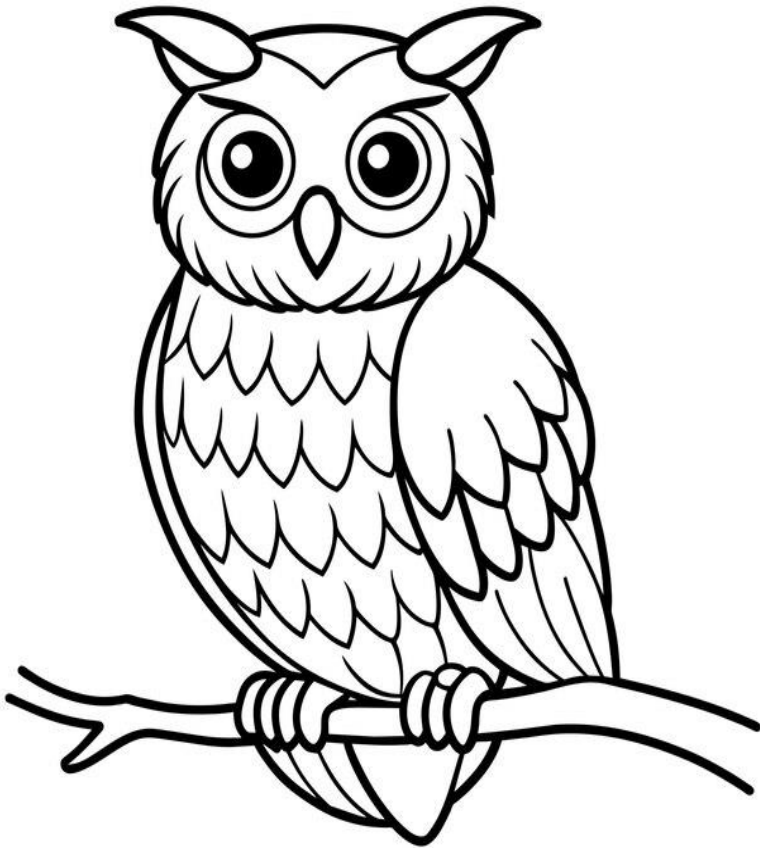

Defibrillators

Following my interest in defibrillators and chatting with neighbours around Smocombe it was decided to apply for a defibrillator. We joined together to fund half the cost and applied for a grant to match the funding and supply the defibrillator. At present The Department of Health & Social Care, defibgrant.co.uk are match funding to increase the number of fully automated defibrillators in the community to the tune of £1million, when all available units have been

claimed the scheme will close. They use London Hearts to provide the units and cabinets. Please read about the charity 'London Hearts' online.

The application was processed very fast, and a defibrillator and cabinet despatched, we used a local electrician who fixed the unit to our fence and wired it in to our neighbour's electricity supply. He had done this many times before! It does require an electricity supply and to be accessible 24 hours a day. Ours is positioned on the fence between the post-boxes for Smocombe Farmhouse and Farm at the end of Smocombe Lane. Our defibrillator will be registered on the circuit so when you dial 999 they will give you the code for the cabinet.

Obviously, there is some distance between us and the defibrillator at the Enmore Golf Club so ideally it would be good to have one in the main village. Maybe someone or a group could sponsor a defibrillator to take advantage of the grant whilst available and we could then all join to reimburse them with some fund-raising activities. Broomfield had just held a successful race evening in their village hall, and this could be one idea.

In the coming months we will arrange some resuscitation and defibrillator training in Enmore Memorial Hall. I do hope you can come along.

Local and Regional Weather Report

January brings us a New Year, but be careful not to wash, to trim your nails or sweep your house on New Year's Day as this brings bad luck. This is also the start of the wassailing season when you put toast in the apple trees, fire your shotgun through the oldest tree and drink your best cider, all tributes to the goddess of fruit Pomona. "If the sun shines before twelve o'clock on Old Christmas Day (January 6th) there will be an abundance of apple blossom and fruit during the year" and "if

the sun shines through the apple trees on that day it will be a good cider year". If the sun shines on St. Paul's day (Jan 25th), it betokens a good year; if rain or snow, an indifferent year; if misty it predicts a bad harvest and if thunder, great winds and much sickness. Fine weather in January is not considered a good omen for the rest of the year "If January weather be summerly gay, Then wintry weather till the end of May" and "If in January the sun appear, Then March and April will pay full dear".

November started dull, dry and mild, but then continued with colder weather and some snow and mist. Storms Bert and Conall brought exceptionally wet and windy weather. Nearly 7 days out of 10 days saw cloudy weather or rain and only 3 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather.

Rainfall: Local 125 mm, Regional 136 mm = +7% of normal

Minimum temperatures: Local 3 deg, Regional 5.4 deg = +1.5 deg

Maximum Temperatures: Local 19 deg, Regional 11.1 deg = +1.3 deg

What are the weather forecasts for January? Met Office says at start, unsettled with average temperatures but colder intervals with frost and fog. No long term forecast available. Netweather no forecast available. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? *The New Moon is within a few days of Christmas Day, so the winter will be hard.* Jet Stream forecast at the start of January is not available yet.

ENMORE PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Although your Council did not meet during December, we have been working on a response to Enmore Park Golf Club's appeal against refusal of planning permission for their proposed bund and infill of the Ancient Packway. We have endeavoured to represent the views of the vast majority of Enmore residents and express our concerns about the detrimental effect of these proposals, both while work is carried out and in the long-term. All previous comments are forwarded with the appeal documents so your earlier submissions are still valid and included.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday 7th January, with an earlier starting time of 6.30pm. This earlier starting time will also apply for March. In the summer, when the days are longer, we will revert to a 7.30pm start.

At the January meeting we will decide on the precept to request for the year from April 2025 to March 2026. This is raised as the Parish Council element of your Council Tax bill and is our principal source of income for all the work done by the Parish Council and for fulfilling our statutory duties. Other income consists of a small amount of interest from money held on deposit at the bank and, where possible, grants towards the cost of larger projects. We try to operate as economically as possible and are fortunate to have volunteers carrying out many jobs, but we also have to be prepared for unexpected costs that may crop up, particularly when both central and other areas of local government are cutting services to cut costs.

We welcome input as to how Enmore Parish Council can best serve village residents and support initiatives that improve the quality of life for all of us.

All good wishes for 2025 from your Councillors and their officers.

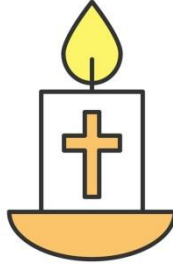

January 2025

A Happy New Year!

It is amazing to think we are a quarter of the way through the 21st Century. As many would say, 'Where has the last year gone?' We have memories to treasure from the last twelve months – some good and some not so good.

For those who are on Facebook, it is fascinating to see the photographs from years past that pop up as a 'memory' and remind us of things we had perhaps forgotten. They also catalogue changes through the years – of fashions and trends, of hobbies and of what we did with our time. Today is a day for looking forward to 2025. You may be resolved to let go of the bad habits and be determined to do so many new things in the next twelve months. I wonder what is on your list!

One of my hopes is that the churches can better meet the needs of the communities they serve. God offers to be alongside all of us, not just those who attend churches Sunday by Sunday, but everyone. How can the people of the churches serve the community in a more involved way?

The churches are part of the diocese (an area that covers most of Somerset) which is led by Bishop Michael. He has asked his churches to consider other ways they could worship and come together apart from the traditional Sunday morning service, to look at learning about God and how to follow him.

To this end, and to make space to explore options, the Sunday morning worship plan will look a bit different in 2025. Like other churches in our benefice of Quantock Villages, Enmore and Goathurst churches will have a new rotation of services. It will continue to offer a service of Holy Communion and Morning or Family Worship at each of the churches during the month and an afternoon or evening service. It will mean that each church has a Sunday when there isn't a service in church. Please do check the service rotas for these.

The churches are planning different types of worship over these weekends. A planned walk, a Songs of Praise service, a pet service, a children's service or a barbecue. One of the benefits of this new rota is that these services can be held at other times during the week or at weekends and give more opportunities for services outside. If you have any ideas, then please contact me, or the churchwardens; we'd love to share your thoughts.

Emmanuel is a name given to Jesus especially at Christmas, and it means *God is with us*. This is true beyond a Sunday morning and beyond the walls of our churches. God is alongside us whoever we are, and wherever we are.

Let it Snow!

Snow can sometimes be seen in January and of course it is loved by children. But it has its problems particularly for wildlife who not only find it difficult to stay warm but to find food as well. Heavy snow and subzero

temperatures mean that we will see casualties unable to find their food and these can be ones that we rarely see. Lapwings that usually come to this country in the winter are unable to cope with snow and others needing food from rhines, rivers or streams like Egrets, Crested Grebes and Water rails will be brought in. The one animal that seems to still cope very well is the fox who can hear the voles under the snow as well as being very good at finding food. We humans have often put food out for them, or they make the most of visiting bins and fast-food vendors in towns and cities.

Badgers will probably stay snug in their setts. They don't hibernate but having put on extra fat in the autumn making the most of the fruits from hedgerows, they can sleep away the really cold weather. The deep sleep is most important for the females. Badgers have delayed implantation which means that they can mate at any time of the year, but it is while they sleep that the embryos attached themselves to the womb and start to grow. The gestation is 7 weeks and even when born, cubs will stay underground for the first eight to ten weeks of their lives.

For us at Secret World, we are lucky that some of our staff and volunteers that live nearby will come in to help out, as travel can sometimes be almost impossible for those living a distance away. Now that we have a warm treatment centre, it means that we can cope with the frozen locks, water pipes and cleaning outside pens if we can

go in for a coffee or tea and a warmup. There's even time for a snowball fight once the work is done!

This is the time when you can help by making sure that a dish of water is out for the birds and putting food out means that you may see some of the more unusual birds coming in. The snow makes the whole world look beautiful from inside a warm home, but we are eventually quite happy to see it go!

Storm Darragh

I'm sure that many people in our villages were inconvenienced to a greater or lesser extent by the storm in early December.

Part way through the Saturday morning when the storm was at its worst, a message went out that a large tree on Mick and Petra Ingram's land near the top of Church Lane in Enmore had come down and was partially blocking the main road. It seemed that within minutes there were a dozen people there, some armed with chainsaws and brooms and even a tractor to help with the clearing.

In no time at all, the tree was cleared and the road free of debris. In so many ways it was typical of the way villagers tend to come together in times of adversity and, as Petra said, the support was quite overwhelming and made her proud to live in Enmore.



By the time you receive this magazine Christmas will be over and if you have some turkey left over and you don't know what to do with it, this recipe might help. Passed on by my mother-in-law, it is a true family favourite. Any surplus turkey filling can be frozen and used at a later date.

Boxing Day Roll

1 block of puff pastry
450 g turkey, minced
1 onion, chopped
1 tbsp tomato puree
1 tspn mixed herbs
1 bay leaf

50g butter
50g plain flour
425ml milk
2 tbsp white wine
50g Cheddar cheese, grated
Seasoning

Cook the chopped onion in a little butter and mix with the minced turkey, tomato puree, mixed herbs and bay leaf.

Melt the butter and add the flour to make a roux. Stir in the milk and white wine to make a thick sauce and season. Add the grated cheese to melt and then stir in the turkey mixture.

Roll out the pastry to a large rectangle and then spread the mixture on the pastry leaving a good inch or so around the edges. Roll up like a Swiss roll, brush the edges with beaten egg and fold in to make a parcel.

Transfer to a baking sheet, slash the top 3 or 4 times and brush all over with beaten egg. Bake at Gas mark 7, 220 degrees for 45 minutes.
